LIMITED PROTECTION

Since the protection it offers is so short-lived, we can't conduct mass inoculations to protect all our children as we have done with the Salk antipolio vaccine.

MODIFYING DOSE

For children over the age of three, a modifying dose of gamma globulin may be recommended by your doctor.

MEASLES RASH DEVELOPS

As a rule, gamma globulin injections are given in the arm or buttock some time between the fourth and eighth day after the youngster is exposed to the disease.
