

# Old Home Week Free-For-Alls Start Tonight

They're using the greatest superlatives about today's racing action at Charlottetown Driving Park.

Veteran race enthusiasts are insisting that the afternoon and night programs contain the most promising action ever presented here. It doesn't look like any exaggeration once you give the cards a careful looking over.

For the first time in the history of Old Home Week, there will be racing Monday afternoon. Eight great dashes make up the program that is certain to get the big week underway with flying colors.

Feature attraction this afternoon will be the junior free-for-all with five bearcats getting the word. On the rail will be Borderview Renown, Elmer C., Dominion Byrd, Time To Go and Miss Kemble are the other entrants. These horses go in dashes four and eight and you can expect thrills galore before the winners are declared.

Tonight The Evening Patriot \$2500 Invitational will be presented. Here is a race with seven of the fastest horses east of Montreal participating. Dee's Boy has the rail position and will surely cut-out a fast half for the other half dozen. These six are Huckster, Hurrah, Queen's Newton, Borderview Roy, Eloise Wick and Andy's Son. Favorites will likely be Andy's Son, Queen's Newton and Dee's Boy but any of the other four have the abilities to get home in front.

Both afternoon and night programs are eight-dash affairs and great throngs are expected to jam the CDP for these outstanding programs.

The afternoon card starts at 2:30; the evening races at 8:30. The program throughout the week will have the same starting time.

# B. Hogg Takes Open Ladies Title

SUMMERSIDE — Veteran golfer Blanche Hogg of the local golf and country club let everyone know that she has completely recovered from a hand injury which kept her off the greens last year by scoring a come-from-behind victory in the two-day provincial ladies golf championship here Saturday.

This is the seventh victory in this event for Miss Hogg since 1955. She was also watching the tourney from the sidelines in 1961, thus giving her seven wins in nine tries.

Following Saturday's play Blanche was trailing Daphne Dagg, also of Summerside, by two strokes with a 92 to Mrs. Dagg's 90. The first day leader ballooned to the 100-mark yesterday however, giving Miss Hogg an easy four-stroke win with her 36-hole total of 186. Her score for the 18 holes Saturday was 94.

Another Summerside golfer finished third in the championship division. Amy Beer registered rounds of 98-90 for a total of 188.

Joyce Beer of Charlottetown finished in fourth place with a 36-hole total of 191 on rounds of 98 and 93. Connie MacMillan, also of Charlottetown, had identical scores of 96-96 for a 192 total.

First low net in the championship division went to Mabel Paris of Summerside with a 155 total.

Glady's Malloy of Summerside emerged the winner in the first division with a 196-0 total on rounds of 97 and 99.

Second was Norma MacFarlane of Summerside with rounds of 102-101 for a 203 total. E. Cox of Charlottetown and Marilyn Linkletter of Summerside tied for third with identical 36-hole totals of 209.

Bobby MacEachern of Charlottetown captured second division honors with a 36-hole total of 218 on rounds of 106-112. Runner-up at 235 was Jane Austin of Summerside and third, Chris Agnew of Charlottetown with 251.

# Winnipeg's W. Homenuik Takes Pro Golf Ch'ships

MONTREAL (CP) — Wilf Homenuik of Winnipeg made consistency pay off Saturday when he won the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association championship with a 54-hole score of 215, five over par and two strokes better than his closest challengers.

Homenuik put together rounds of 72-71-72 against Royal Montreal's tough par 70 over a 6,740-yard layout that gave up only one sub-par score, a 69 by Dick Munn of Victoria, and five pars through the entire three rounds.

The 143-pound Winnipegger, who played the Caribbean tour last winter and won \$4,800, collected \$2,000 and was presented with the Seagram shield for his win Saturday.

Tied for second at 217 were three Toronto pros — Alvie Thompson, CPGA winner two years ago, Harry McIlree and Moe Norman. Each won \$1,233.

At Belding-of-Toronto, winner in 1962, was alone at 219 and won \$900. Belding, has just returned to competition after surgery for shoulder trouble that forced him to leave the golf tour last winter.

Homenuik, 29, and a pro at the Bel Acres Club in Winnipeg, had a two-stroke lead going into Saturday's final round. After the front nine the lead had shrunk to one, with McIlree and Frank Whibley of Kitchener, Ont., right behind him.

Whibley went to pieces on the back nine, twice hitting into ponds, and took a six-over-par 41 to finish with 76 and a tournament total of 221.

McIlree missed par by poor putting at the first three holes of the last nine but pulled himself together to finish with 71 for 217.

"I choked up," said McIlree, an Irish-born pro attached to the club. He is devoting his time to playing.

Meanwhile, Homenuik went serenely on, concentrating on trying for par from hole to hole and taking advice from his caddy, Louis Adams, and from Danny Stack, pro at Winnipeg Glendale who missed the cutoff Friday.

He said he had several good breaks and didn't even know how the other players stood until his third shot at the 18th.

As winner of the Alberta Open earlier this year, Homenuik will play in the world tournament this week at Sutton, Mass.
