

Russian Paper Says China Pushes Smuggling Of Drugs

MOSCOW (AP)—Pravda has declared Communist China earns \$500,000,000 annually in the narcotics smuggling trade.

"This trade has become one of the main sources of convertible currency for the leadership of the Chinese Communist party," the Soviet Communist party organ charged in a report from Japan. "The tremendous profits are used for anti-Soviet propaganda or to subsidize the puppets of the Peking splitters."

The report quoted Tsuiji Sugawara, chairman of the national Japanese Committee for the Struggle Against Drug Addiction, as saying China is "the world's principal producer of opium poppies which yield opium, morphine and heroin."

Sugawara estimated the Chinese were smuggling about \$170,000,000 worth of narcotics annually into Japan, or about a third of their total production.

"Most drugs are shipped to Southeast Asia and large consignments also reach the United States," he added.

sales of drugs amounted to \$70,000,000 annually and drew the conclusion that such currency incomes could be substantially increased."

Pravda said narcotics production was raised from 2,000 tons annually in 1952 to 5,000 tons during the first years of Peking's "great leap forward" economic drive beginning in 1958. The report estimated China now has about 60,000,000 acres planted in opium-producing poppies.

"Corrective labor camps were switched to the production of drugs," it continued. "The entire opium policy is directed by the Peking board for the procurement and sale of special goods of local production."

"Pharmaceutical and chemical enterprises in the towns of Dalian, Tientsin, Chengde, Kandy, Kunming, Dai Yuan and others are processing opium raw materials."

Pravda concluded: "To accept the methods of the imperialists, to collaborate with the owners of opium dens, is abominable and monstrous. But it is also logical for those who in order to promote their authoritarian nationalistic schemes ignore the vital interests of their people."

SECRET MEETING HELD
The Pravda report said Chinese leaders embarked on mass production of narcotics following a secret conference in Peking in 1952. The newspaper added.

Church Council Urges Gov't Health Service

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The general council of the United Church of Canada has urged the federal government to develop a national health service plan "as soon as possible."

"At the church's biennial conference, the board of evangelism and social service stressed a need for urgency in working out the plan so that 'the health needs of all citizens' will be adequately met, regardless of income, age, isolation or chronic illness," the board said.

The board also urged dental care and pharmaceuticals.

The board also asked the council to strongly oppose lotteries of any kind as ways of raising money for charitable purposes. Government-sponsored lotteries "have proven to be an inefficient means of raising money" in other countries.

In another report, the board called on the church's membership to "root out racial prejudice and discrimination and to promote further integration of racial and ethnic groups" within the denomination.

"Anti-semitism in all its forms is to be condemned and 'warm understanding' must be developed in relations with Jews."

"The Christian church has not always given a lead in matters of human rights and liberty," the board said, urging repentance of farrogance, apathy and intolerance.

An interim report of the commission of world mission said:

Skeleton Found At Louisbourg
LOUISBOURG, N.S. (CP)—The National Parks Service has a body on its hands here, but whether it's the remains of a nobleman or thief they don't know.

Archaeologists investigating the site of the royal chapel at Louisbourg Fortress uncovered the bones, encased in a lead coffin.

There was no trace of a shroud or clothing, but they assume only a nobleman would rate the metal coffin.

Louisbourg Fortress on the eastern tip of Cape Breton Island, was the centre of French power in North America until its capture by British troops in 1758. Two years later the massive stone walls of the bastion were razed.

The excavations are part of the parks service program to restore parts of the fortress.

When the chapel is rebuilt officials say, the body will be re-interred and its location marked by a floor tablet.

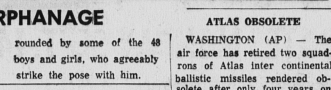
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FUND CHAIRMAN VISITS ORPHANAGE

Robert Kennedy Becomes Political Hurricane In N.Y.

Robert F. Kennedy started his campaign for the U.S. Senate in New York more than a week ago. At times it seemed more like a movie idol's tour than a politician on the hustings.

NEW YORK (AP)—Is it the allure of the name, "Kennedy" it is curious to see in a person the man about whom so much has been said, pro and con?

If sympathy for the brother of an assassinated president, making him the recipient today for all the grief and awe of last November?

Whatever the answer—and no body could say with certainty—Robert F. Kennedy was a political hurricane in northern New York state last week. Sweeping across predominantly Republican territory, the Democrat stirred waves of emotion, scenes of frenzy, an astonishing human storm.

Women smeared his face with lipstick. Bright girls hid his ear to grab and kiss his hand in Plattsburgh, a man groped him around the neck and pounded his back, yelling, "Bobby! Bobby!" He was shoveled with flowers, confetti and rice as his open convertible passed.

his brother's successor, had dined him out of the vice-presidential derby.

And there was the fact that Keating is popular and respected, with a long record in Washington.

Kennedy flew to Binghamton in the Caroline—the plane that John F. Kennedy used in his successful presidential campaign of 1960.

LIKE 1960 AGAIN
It was like the 1960 campaign all over again, but with one difference: John F. Kennedy was almost invariably gay and high-spirited between stops, whereas vestiges of the stricken haunted expression still come over Robert Kennedy's face and he stares out the window in long silences.

During the three days, he made 31 speeches in 15 cities and 21 smaller communities.

On Thursday, the last day of the tour, he fell four hours behind his announced times of arrival.

He reached Plattsburgh, next-to-last stop in the itinerary, exactly at midnight Thursday night. To his own surprise, several thousand persons were still waiting, packed tight behind the fences at the airport.

Other Cousins jammed the approaches of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Bridge over Saranac River. Kennedy dedicated it in a brief and solemn ceremony, recalling the words of his brother's inaugural address: "... The torch is passed."

Back in his car as he left the bridge, he turned to an aide and asked: "Do I have to make another speech?" His voice was hoarse.

"One more here, Bob," the aide said. "There are a lot of people waiting in town. You can make a political speech there."

Kennedy didn't take the suggestion. In the crowd, he saw a placard: Robert Kennedy represents irresponsible government.

Taking this as his cue, he cited the actions of the John F. Kennedy - Johnson administration, closing each shouted sentence with the words, "is that irresponsible government!"

The crowd roared and the placard disappeared.

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MAILED BY CROWDS
Three times, while standing in the car to shake hands, he was almost pulled over backwards. He was mauled, pummelled and crushed in the crowds.

This happened over and over again.

Kennedy is campaigning for the seat in the U.S. Senate now held by Republican Kenneth Keating, who is seeking re-election Nov. 3. Last Tuesday, he began a three-day tour of northern New York. Some of the cities there are Democratic and one swing between the parties in elections. But Kennedy went into counties where the Republican holds in registration in three- and four-to-one.

Nobody knew what to expect.

There was the "carpetbag" charge, based on the fact that Kennedy was born in Massachusetts and has been living in Virginia.

There was the fact that he did not declare for the Senate race until after President Johnson.

Bank Ordered To Pay Mines \$960,000

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce was ordered by the Ontario Supreme Court here to pay Brimind Mines Ltd. \$960,000 because it improperly paid a cheque on the Brimind account in 1957.

Actions against two bank managers, Frederick Findlay and Frank Udell, were dismissed by Mr. Justice Campbell Grant.

The suit arose from the sale of control of Brimind in 1957 by brothers Ben and Harry Smith to a group of New York businessmen headed by Sol Rauch and Stanley Schomberg.

The bank certified a \$800,000 cheque for a purchaser although the cost was paid, he had only \$166 in his account at the time it was cashed.

Ben Smith testified he accepted the cheque as payment for shares of Brimind he held but said he had no knowledge of second cheque for \$800,000 was drawn on the Brimind account in favor of the purchaser.

W. E. Williston, counsel for Brimind, said the transaction could not have been carried out without the active participation of the bank.

The judgment includes interest from May 1, 1957.
