**SIMON DAVIES, ESQUIRE.**

THE noncurrent, the death of Simon Davies, Esq., will be read with surprise as well as regret by many friends in this city and elsewhere. Yet death came as a happy release from a life which has lately been one of pain and great suffering, caused by cancer in the throat. Mr. Davies was for many years one of the principal merchants of Charlottetown. He was a member, in succession, of the firms of D. G. & S. Davies, G. & S. Davies, and Simon Davies & Co., occupying the London House. Having amassed a considerable fortune, he retired from business and proceeded to England, where he lived for several years. Subsequently he returned to Charlottetown. While in active life he took a great interest in our volunteer militia, and he was for some time Captain of the Artillerymen of Charlottetown. In private life he was known for his kindness of heart and his love of his family. He was a younger brother of the Hon. Benjamin Davies and the Hon. Daniel Davies. Early in life he married Miss Flora Ray Townsend, of Cheshire, England. Mrs. Davies and four sons—Cecil, who is now in New Zealand; Fred, in Ontario; Arthur in Vancouver; and John, who remains at home—survive him; and they have the sympathy of the community.

**THE PATRIOT AND THE FERRY.**

THE Patriot is never so amusing as when it tries to be serious. It is never more reliable than when it undertakes to set THE EXAMINER right. Its article of yesterday regarding the Government ferry steamers is a case in point. It says in one breath that THE EXAMINER is wrong in its statement regarding the officers of the Southport, and in the next admits that neither Neil Robinson, who commands that steamer, nor Geo Warry, the engineer, has a certificate. It is currently reported that Mr. Robinson, who is acting as captain of the Southport, although he has not a certificate, is to be given command of the Hillsborough in succession to Captain McPherson. But for obvious reasons the steamer was commanded by a certificated captain during her recent trip to Pictou for the locomotives. THE Patriot does not deny THE EXAMINER's charge that the Southport is running without being inspected, although she has been laid up for about two years. As a matter of fact it is so long since she was inspected that it would take the proverbial "oldest inhabitant" to recall the date. As for the life-saving apparatus the Patriot says it is in keeping with the law. That is not THE EXAMINER's information. THE EXAMINER in this matter is acting only in the interests of the travelling public. It has been careful of its facts, and is not trying to create needless suspicion and alarm. THE Patriot should assist in promoting the public welfare with regard to these steamers, instead of the publisher of statements that do not tally with the facts.
