Longshot To Carry Can. Colors In Leiby

LONDON (CP) — Prince d'Amour, a longshot hope from France, will carry Canadian colors in the June 6 English Derby at Epsom.

The colt, formerly owned by Mrs. Lucy Vollera, passed a veterinary's test Wednesday and automatically became the property of Alberta Rancher owned by Calgary sportsman Max Bell and Frank McMahon.

Prince d'Amour's Derby odds dipped from 25 to 1 to 20 to 1 in Wednesday night's caller's prices. The current favorite is Major Lionel Holliday's Hetherald at 11 to 2.

One published report estimated that Alberta Rancher's bet on Prince d'Amour. The "Canadian" colt is thus a half-brother to Vamour, winner of a French St. Leger.

Prince d'Amour will be ridden by the great Australian jockey, 46-year-old Scobie Breasley, and will be trained by Sir Gordon Richards, former champion jockey.

For years, Bell has fixed his sights on the Derby. His candi-

dates have been Indian Hemp, Alberta Blue, Blue Sall and Alberta Pride. The best performance came from Alberta Blue, which finished sixth in 1958 after some scrimmaging. Jockey Johnny Longden thought the horse would have finished close up with a clear run.

One British newspaper, The Daily Sketch, describes Bell as "Canada's greatest racing optimist."

He is expected to shoot for France's rich Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe this fall with his four-year-old colt, Four-and-Twenty, which is currently slaughtering all opposition in California.

There's an intriguing angle to Bell's latest purchase. The catch is that Mrs. Vollera has another French candidate in her stable, named Le Cantillon, also a 20-to-1 shot in advance betting.

The first player 'Spdy' gave us the rundown on is Billy MacMillan, who played with the Majors this past season. Billy was hampered with injuries several times during the year but came on strong in the playoffs.

The young solid winger, who tips the scales at around 180 pounds, has one more year left in the junior bracket but the Leafs, taking no chances in St. Mike's, are being picked up by one of the other NHL clubs, signed Billy to a "C" form and placed him on the protected list of the North Bay Trappers of the Eastern Pro League.

Billy received a sizeable bonus for signing and he'll be back in St. Mike's uniform this fall.

The second City player who attended St. Mike's was Jimmy Cullen. As a rookie, Jimmy had an outstanding year with St. Mike's Junior 'B' squad, scoring twenty goals. Olympic Team Named in Aug.

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's Olympic hockey team will be named in August by officers of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

Delegates to the final session of the CAHA's annual meeting of all 10 pro teams from April Thursday after rejecting President Jack Roxburgh's motion not to send a team to the 1964 Winter Olympics.

Roxburgh argued that because Canada pays an average of \$100,000 to its players to compensate for the loss of their jobs, it is not an Olympic cash. He said the oath forbids players from taking any money.

He said Canada thus is winking its eye at the oath and setting a bad example to the country's youth.

He said the oath should be amended so that athletes who do not make their livelihood from sport are eligible for the team.

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
