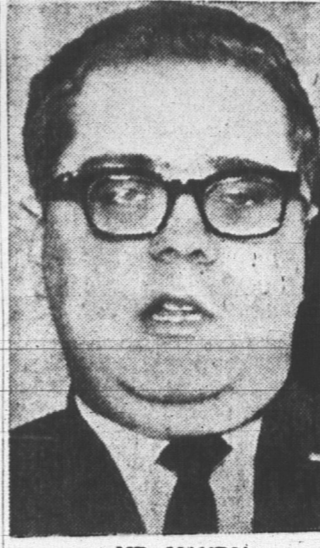


Travel Project Discussed Here

Peter Mandia, officer for the Centennial Commission's youth travel project, was in Charlottetown yesterday to discuss the project with officials of the department of education.

The project, one of the Commission's main centennial projects, will pay all expenses for 4,000 high school students across Canada to visit other areas of the country this summer. The third summer the project has been underway. The purpose of the project is to help young Canadians to know one another better, to help them overcome the prejudices of regionalism and to promote understanding. Students will spend a week with a host family, and will take part in a full program of educational activity, touring local historical spots, industrial sites and so on.

Students from all 10 provinces and the two territories will be selected by the local departments of education, and the project will run through July and August.

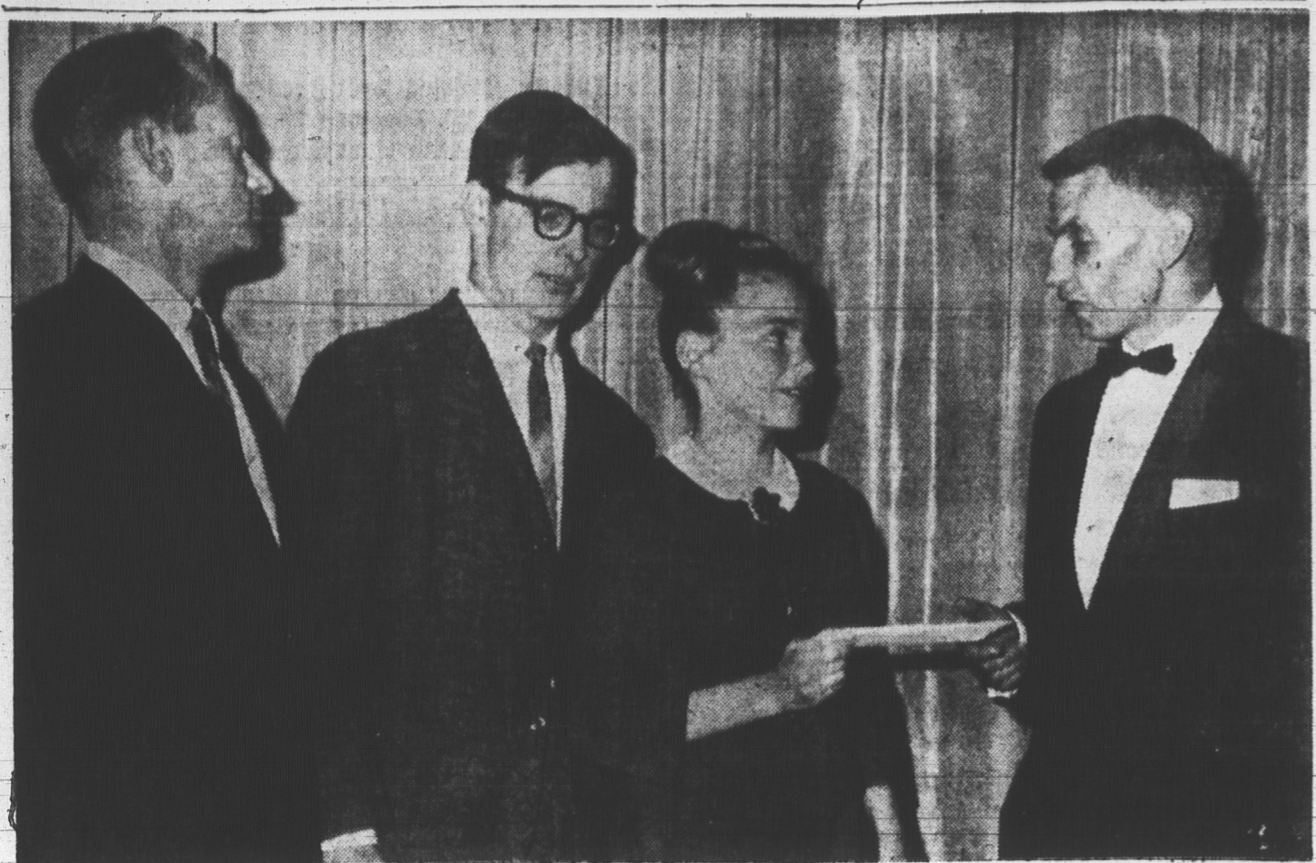
A gift on behalf of the cribbage players was presented to Lloyd Mallard who conducted the tournament.

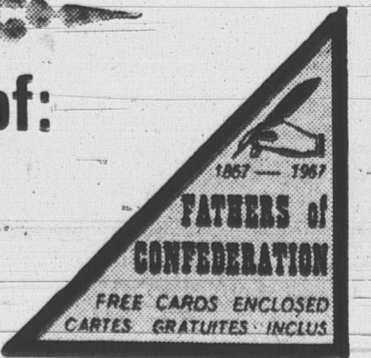
