

New Cadet Band Planned At S'side

Organization of a new Summerside sea cadet band was discussed Wednesday at a meeting in the Royal Canadian Legion home attended by parents and interested youths.

W. J. Conkey, bandmaster at RCAF Station Summerside, who will direct the proposed new sea cadet band said that about 75 parents and sons attended the meeting, in addition to some 40 boys whose parents were not present.

Roy Boates, chairman of the sea cadet committee of the Legion branch at Summerside explained why the band was being formed, and bandmaster Conkey explained how this would be done.

"Although the band will be associated with the sea cadet movement, it will be completely separate from it," Mr. Conkey stated. He explained that a boy must be 14 years of age before he can join the sea cadet ranks. "At that age it's getting odd to train instrumental music," explained Mr. Conkey, "so we are asking boys from the age of nine, and although they will not be regular sea cadets, it will be expected of them to join the ranks when they become of age."

NOT MANDATORY
Mr. Conkey said it would not be mandatory to join the sea cadet movement then, but most boys would naturally do so of their own accord.

At the meeting two films were shown from the Canadian bureau of advancement of music, that depicted problems involved in building a band and how they may be overcome.

Application forms must be signed by parents and received by Legion Manager Charles Craig by this Friday night. He noted that application forms are still available from Mr. Craig for interested boys.

Following the receiving of application forms the band committee will conduct a personal interview with each boy and evaluate just what type of instrument he would best be suited for.

About 42 applications were received Wednesday Mr. Conkey noted.

Gov't survey planned To Find Growing Costs

Guardian-Patriot Staff Writer Acting premier and agriculture minister Andrew MacBain, Thursday expressed concern over price cutting by potato dealers on the Newfoundland market.

Some Island dealers have been under-selling on this market. It was reported on Wednesday, and it is felt that the practice can put the potato industry in jeopardy by depressing prices.

It came to light Thursday during discussions among government officials that one dealer last weekend sold two car-loads of potatoes in Newfoundland at a price of 40 cents per bag. Also that several Island dealers have been selling potatoes for as low as \$1.69 per bag.

St. John's Board of Trade officials, concerned over the matter, have said that potatoes should not be sold at prices lower than \$2.00 to \$2.25 a bag.

POLICE ITSELF
Mr. MacBain said he felt that there is not much the government can do about price-cutting, adding that the potato industry itself could perhaps do more, particularly by policing itself.

He suggested that growers be careful at what price they sell to dealers. "We feel," he said, "that it costs about \$1 per bushel to grow potatoes and if they are sold for less, the grower loses."

To insure that growers will have the minimum cost of growing potatoes, Mr. MacBain said that the depart-

OTTAWA (CP)—Sam Hughes has resigned his \$22,000-a-year post as chairman of the Civil Service Commission of Canada in government.

Slanted Well Oil Stealing Is Described By Driller

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Whipstock Bill James sat in the sweatbox of a courtroom and listened in terms a layman could understand how to sink a slanted oil well.

The frequent application of his skilled hands and set off one of the new, great scandals in Texas.

It involves more people than the Billie Sol Estes affair, it is called start-hole drilling, or crooked well drilling, or deviated drilling.

A crooked well is drilled so the bottom is under another oilman's lease. Thus the slant well can steal his neighbor's oil.

Authorities say oil worth \$10,000,000 a year is stolen this way.

The state says it has found more than 125 illegally drilled wells. Sixty-four were cut off by the operators before crews could test them.

Whipstock Bill testified there may be as many as 300 to 350 crooked wells in the East Texas field alone.

Asked how many he had drilled, he first said: "I know. God only knows." Later he estimated 100.

SHAFT HITS TARGET
Whipstock Bill said a driller with the proper skills can drill beneath a point three-quarters of a mile away and not miss his mark a decree.

The driller gained his name from a device called a whipstock. It is a piece of pipe placed in the well. Its top is slanted at a pre-determined angle.

When a drilling bit is rotated in the well, the whipstock nudges the bit a little to one side, slanting the hole.

Whipstock testified in Dallas before a state legislative investigating committee. He said he obtains more allowable.

Witnesses at the hearing said leased with zero production from pipelines. This means the oilmen have no way to market it. Nearly 600 wells were cut off at one time, although a few connections have since been re-started.

Whipstock Bill also described the plastic pipe trick.

"It was so you could carry oil and you couldn't find it with a magnetic," he said. He referred to mine detector - type devices.
