

Three Yanks And Japanese Named Nobel Prize Winners

STOCKHOLM (Reuters)—
Three Americans and a Japanese have been awarded the 1965 Nobel Prize in physics and chemistry.

The work for which they won the prizes could lead to further miniaturization of computers and radios and better antibiotics and anesthetics.

The three scientists sharing the physics prize for their work in quantum electrodynamics are professors Julian Schwinger, 47, of Harvard University, Richard Feynman, 47, of the California Institute of Technology, and Shinichiro Tomonaga, 59, of the Tokyo University of Education.

Another Harvard professor, Robert Burns Woodward, 48, whose work has produced several new antibiotics, won the chemistry prize for his services

to the study of organic synthesis.

The Nobel prizes are worth \$50,000. The three physics winners will split their prize money.

Tomonaga and Professor Hid-eki Yukawa, who won the physics prize in 1949, are the only Japanese ever to receive Nobel awards.

MEASURE RADIATION
Professors Schwinger, Feynman and Tomonaga discovered in the late 1940s a means of measuring the interaction of the electron and the radiation field surrounding it.

Their work was described as "extremely useful . . . for the understanding of the new elementary particles within high-energy physics and for the treatment of certain collective phenomena in the subject of solid state physics."

China's Hierarchy Chiefs Look Spry And Confident

PEKING (Reuters)—
China today, more unified than ever, is building higher its new great wall of self-sufficiency against the outside world.

A better-fed, better-clothed and better-housed populace is being told to rely on its own efforts for everything.

Willingness to expand trade with friendly countries and buy overseas if the price is right still is expressed in high places.

But the mood of the country set by the writings of 73-year-old Communist party chairman

Mao Tse-tung is: "Let us match all that foreigners can do, then achieve what they can not."

All that the elderly Communist leadership promises its flock of some 700,000,000 is a good life decades hence—some-thing the leaders themselves are unlikely to live to see.

TRADES WITH 120 NATIONS

Statements that China now trades with 120 countries and territories and wants more two-way trade on the basis of "mutual advantage and mutual respect" are somewhat offset by: —The intensity of the drive for self-sufficiency in agriculture, light and heavy industries, chemicals, petroleum and raw materials.

—A foreign policy which this year has seen a lessening of support for Peking in a number of African countries, setbacks at the Afro-Asian conference in Algiers, the anti-Communist campaign in Indonesia and reverses for the Viet Cong guerrillas in South Viet Nam.

—The needs of a huge unsatisfied home market, coupled with a limited range of exportable goods to pay for heavy imports.

The new great wall makes sense to the average Chinese—ill-informed on international affairs.

U.S. HATED

He sees himself surrounded by the hated "U.S. imperialists" and their allies on three sides and faced by the Russian "revisionists" on the fourth.

Children are being indoctrinated from the nursery upward. A fantastic number of people—perhaps 200,000,000—who have never seen an American in the flesh, are being force-fed a monotonous anti-U.S. diet.

The Chinese leaders are determined to try to prevent the children of the revolution—the generation born after 1949—from accepting the concept of "rich communism."

Attacks on the Russian revisionists are made in parallel to the anti-American campaign.

One high official said: "We are determined to carry on our revolution. So we are bringing up the younger generation to be the successors to the revolution."

DIFFICULT TO JUDGE
Just how far China has ac-

tually progressed in the 16 years since the Communists overthrew the Kuomintang government of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek in a state secret.

The secret is kept by the ban on travel throughout the country and the refusal to disclose any meaningful production statistics.

From the carefully conducted tour I was given, it was not possible to make a complete or accurate judgment.

The attitude of "time is on our side" is most apparent. But what I saw generally, from crops to clothes, from meals to machinery, from take home pay to transport, was considerably better than I had expected.

Pope Sees Need For RC Church

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI said here that modern world problems demand an immediate and effective presence of the Roman Catholic Church "throughout the world."

Speaking on Vatican Radio, the pontiff called on all Roman Catholics, not only missionaries to carry the word of Christ, "so that all the children of God, who are already in the house of the Lord, will remember their brothers who are still outside, and will unite with us in prayers and in fraternal works of charity."

The Pope spoke in connection with World Missionary Day, observed by Roman Catholics Sunday.

Pope Paul said that on his trips to the Holy Land, India and the United Nations in New York, he sensed appeals for "the triumph of fraternal charity, respect for justice, for peace, in the recognition of the common Father who is God."

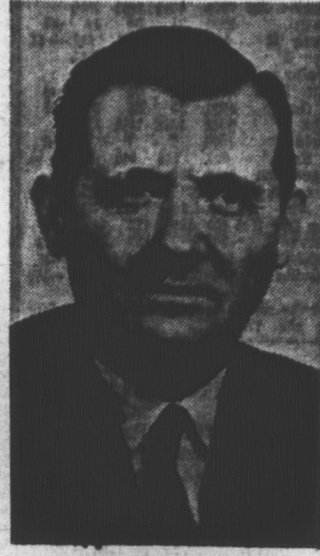

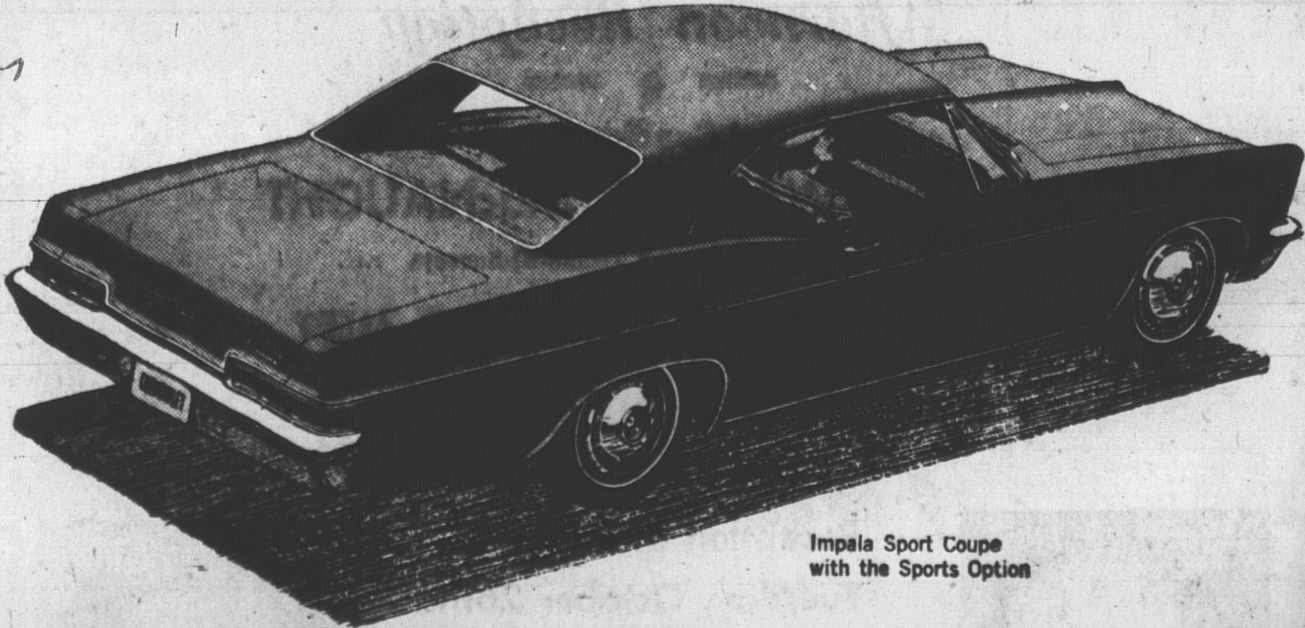
